## **Course Objectives:**

## **Unannounced Reading Quizzes (20%; 5% each)**

Class attendance, preparation, and participation are important to the quality of the class and your experience in it. To encourage attendance, you will write 4 unannounced reading quizzes that will cover the readings assigned for the day of the quiz. Quizzes will be written at the beginning of class. If you are late for one of the legitimate reasons outlined in the course policies, the average of the remaining quizzes will be entered as your grade for the quiz missed. In all other cases, those that are late or absent will receive a grade of 0.

## 4 Lab Assignments (20%; 5% each)

Labs are important for you to apply material covered in class and aid in your understanding and application of course material. Attendance in labs is required. Grades for this component are based on labs assigned by your graduate Teaching Assistants. More information about these will be provided at your first lab.

### 3 Exams (60%; 20% each)

The course is divided into three distinct sections. Each of these sections represents course topics that fit together thematically. At the end of each section, there will be an exam. While exams may require cumulative knowledge, they will focus on the particular section being tested. Exams will include both multiple choice and written response and will reflect content covered in both lectures and labs.

# **Technology**

#### **Emails**

Please contact me over email at any time, but include the course number in your email's subject line. It is courteous to include a proper salutation, your full name, student ID, and a proper closing in the body of your email. Emails without customary email conventions (see previous sentence) will be ignored. This is true for TA emails as well. Emails will be answered within one business day, but may not be answered over the weekend. Emails should be only for administrative purposes such as scheduling an appointment. Please do not use email as a replacement for an office visit. Questions about course content and readings, concerns about grades, or other personal issues should be dealt with in person during my office hours.

### **Assignments and Deferrals**

It is your responsibility to complete and submit all assignments on time. If possible, you must tell the course instructor in advance if you are unable to take a test or hand in an assignment at the required time. All requests for exam or assignment deferrals due to health reasons must be accompanied by written documentation as outlined in the University Calendar, and should be obtained while you are experiencing the physical or emotional problem rather than after recovery. Deferrals will be allowed due to illness, domestic affliction or religious conviction. Travel arrangements, misreading of the syllabus, and scheduling conflicts with other classes or employment responsibilities are not valid reasons for requesting a deferral. Deferrals will not be granted if just cause is not shown by the students. There are NO EXCEPTIONS.

If you miss an exam for a legitimate reason, you may be required to write a make up test or choose to transfer the exams weight to another course component. If I schedule a 'make up' exam, the date and location will be at the convenience of the Sociology Department.

Late assignments (as of the beginning of class on dates indicated in the assignment schedule) without excuse are subject to a **5 percentage point deduction for each day past the due date** (i.e. 90% instead of 95%). Assignments not submitted within 7 calendar days of the due date without approval for extension will receive a grade of 0.
