Course Description

This course will introduce students to the discipline of sociology, or the critical, systematic and empirical study of human societies, of human actions and interactions. The scope of this course ranges from the examination of brief everyday social encounters to the study of global macro-social processes. Students will develop their “sociological imagination”, by learning new ways of seeing, thinking and knowing. They develop their analytic ability that helps them understand the world beyond the taken for granted aspects of social life. Sociologists ask *how* and *why* things came to be the way they are today.

The course will guide you to apply a sociological lens to local, national, regional and global issues, by examining the larger social structures that impact our lives. We will examine different forms of

stratifications and oppression by categories such as gender, race, ethnicity, age, and ability. We will discuss the socialization process and consider the importance of culture and structure in our lives. In addition, we will discuss some of the ways we do sociological research. Our case studies are from both our Canadian society and from different parts of the world.

By the end of this course, students will realize that much of what we consider social facts are social constructs shaped by historical, political, economic and social factors.

Course Objectives/Learning Outcomes

By the end of the course, student will be able to:

- Explain the history, main theories and main concepts of sociology
- Demonstrate knowledge of different sociological research methods
- Develop a critical analysis of how large-scale social institutions shape our lives and our society.
- Apply the sociological imagination on social problems we face in our everyday life.
- Analyze the importance of culture and socialization on the individual
- Evaluate the role of social stratification in the formation of different social structures and cleavages, including class, gender and sexuality, race and ethnicity, age and dis/ability.
- Apply the different sociological approaches on various social phenomena in Canada and globally.

Course Format

This course is taught asynchronously, using pre-recorded lectures, Powerpoint slides and other learning tools such as short videos and documentaries. I will upload the required materials for the week on Tuesdays at 8:00 a.m. Calgary time.

You should expect 150 minutes of instructional time every week. This includes the pre-recorded lectures, videos and PowerPoint, but it does not include your own readings and course preparation.

Exam 1 and 2

The purpose of the exam is to test your understanding of the concepts and the different sociological phenomena discussed during the lectures and all the learning materials used in the course. The exams will be available for 24 hours from 8:00 a.m. (Calgary time) on

- September 20 (exam 1, 15% of the grade, topics 1 and 2)
- November 1 (exam 2, 25% of the grade, topics 5 to 8).
- TBD by the registrar (Final exam, 30% of the grade, topics 9, 11 and 12)

You can start the exam anytime within these 24 hours, but once you start it, you have 75 minutes (1.5 hours) to complete it. Only one attempt at the examination is allowed. So please make sure you have a reliable internet connection during your exam.

The exam will be delivered through the D2L quiz function, in multiple choice and true/ false. The exact number of questions will be communicated via email.

The quizzes are closed-book examinations (i.e. required readings, recorded video lectures, PowerPoint slides posted on D2L, and notes cannot be used when taking the examination). Examinations must be taken individually (i.e. sharing exam questions, exam answers or any other information with other students in the class in any way [voice, text, chat, discord server etc.] during the time that an examination is available is not permitted)). D2L discussion:

You will be assigned to a Learning Group made up of 10 students who will participate together in three Group Discussions. For each discussion, you will be given a specific case study to analyze sociologically, using the different concepts we have learned in class. Each student in each group is supposed to engage in discussing the case study, by writing only one

paragraph of 7-10 sentences, using one sociological concept discussed in class. Each student is also supposed to critically engage with the discussion with one other student in their group.

The grade will be distributed on

- 1) The analysis of the case study (70% of the grade- one paragraph only).
- 2) The engagement in the discussion with another student in the group (30% of the grade).

Please note that the course director and/ or the TA will be reading your contributions without commenting on each intervention.

Grade Reappraisal

Within two weeks of the date the exam/assignment is returned, students seeking reappraisal of examinations or assignments must submit a written response to the instructor explaining the basis for reconsideration of one’s mark. The instructor will reconsider the grade assigned and will then book a time with the student to discuss their own work and rationale. It should be noted that a re- assessed grade may be raised, lowered, or remain the same.
