#### **COURSE DESCRIPTION:**

The sociological study of society, social institutions, group behaviour, personality formation and social change. Areas of sociological concern such as social organization, social stratification, ethnic relations, family structure, education, gender relations, deviance and globalization are examined using some of the major concepts, theories and procedures of sociological inquiry.

#### **LEARNING OBJECTIVES:**

Students will be expected to learn the appropriate sociological terminology, concepts, theories and paradigms. They should be able to apply these to the substantive (subject) areas listed above, among others. A goal of this course is to prepare students to think critically about current issues, using a <u>scientific</u> approach.

#### WRITTEN ASSIGNMENT:

A written assignment of approximately 10 pages typed, double-spaced, will be submitted by each student. The paper will require the student to apply particular sociological paradigms and theories to the analysis of one of a choice of topics of current social interest provided by the instructor.

Assignments not submitted by the deadline of June 18<sup>th</sup> will be penalized 10% per day including Saturdays and Sundays. **Do not E-mail assignments!** It is the responsibility of the student to print out a hard copy to be graded – not that of the instructor.

Handing in papers outside of class, return of final papers, and release of final grades:

When students are unable to submit papers in class, they should make arrangements to hand in their papers directly to the instructor or teaching assistant. Papers will not be accepted in the main Sociology Department office. Please do not simply slip assignments under the office door of the instructor or teaching assistant as they will be considered "submitted" when they are found, and penalties may be applied for assumed late submissions.

Final papers will not be returned through the main Sociology Department office. The Freedom of Information and Privacy (FOIP) legislation disallows the practice of having students retrieve assignments from a public place (i.e. outside an instructor's office, the department office etc.) Students who want their final papers returned by mail must attach a stamped, self-addressed envelope with the paper. Otherwise final papers will be available for pick-up only during the instructor's office hours, at the end of this term or at the beginning of the next term.

Final grades are not posted by the Sociology Department. They are available only online.

#### FORMAT OF EXAMINATIONS:

All examinations in this course will be multiple choice. Each of the two midterms will consist of 60 multiple choice questions. The final will be made up of 100 multiple choice questions. None of the exams, including the final, will be cumulative in nature, although some carry-over is to be expected with regard to theory. Each exam will be based on the textbook, the lectures, the videorecordings and class discussions. Approximately 50% of each exam will pertain to material not in the text itself, so regular attendance is crucial to success in this course. Good note-taking is essential, and a student who has missed a class must get the notes from a fellow classmate. The instructor does not teach from notes, and any slides which accompany the lecture provide only a skeleton outline of each session. They in no way contain enough information on their own to prepare the student for the exams.

#### **USE OF TECHNOLOGY DURING EXAMS:**

Dictionaries, data or internet-enabled phones (i.e. Blackberry, I-Phone etc.), laptops or other electronic devices may not be used during examinations. All such devices are to be out of sight and all cell phones must be turned off. Since the format of the exams is multiple choice, no computers or word processors will be required or permitted, even if a student has a documented disability.

#### GENERAL EXAM AND ASSIGNMENT POLICIES:

A student must provide <u>advance</u> notice to the instructor if he/she is unable to take an exam. All requests for deferral of an examination due to health reasons must be accompanied by written documentation as outlined in the University Calendar. This documentation should be obtained while the student has the physical or emotional problem rather than after recovery. Deferred exams may be allowed in the following circumstances: illness, domestic affliction or religious conviction. If a student has missed an exam for a legitimate reason, he/she will be able to write a "make-up" exam as close to the original exam as possible. The date and location will be at the convenience of the Sociology Department. Travel arrangements, poor time management and misreading of the syllabus are not valid reasons for requesting a deferred exam. Deferred exams will not be granted if it is determined that just cause is not shown by the student.

Some videos or DVDs, however, will have been borrowed from other instructors potentially from other institutions, and the student will have no access to them should he/she miss seeing them in class.
