Course Description

This course provides an introduction to research methods in sociology. You will learn about the various stages of conducting a sociological research project, including research design, research project implementation (data collection and analysis), reporting your findings, and evaluating research findings. This course provides the foundation for many of the upper-level courses in our department, where you may be required both to evaluate others' research and to conduct your own research projects.

Course Objectives/Learning Outcomes

1. To introduce you to the social scientific research process, including research design, data collection, data analysis, and report writing.
2. To demonstrate the link between theoretical questions and empirical investigations in social science.
3. To introduce you to ethical issues encountered by social scientists conducting research with human subjects.
4. To introduce you to basic qualitative and quantitative data collection and analysis techniques used by sociologists.

Required Textbooks, Readings, Materials

Readings are assigned for each day of class. Please come to class every day having read the materials.

Methods of Evaluation

Exams: You will have two mid-terms. The mid-terms will each be worth 30% of your final grade. The mid-terms will be held during class time on 9 October and 22 November. Exams are cumulative, and mandatory. If you fail to take any of the exams without documentation, you will automatically fail the course.

NOTE: There are NO MAKE UP exams in this class. If you miss the first mid-term examination, and you provide me with the appropriate documentation, the weight of the first mid-term exam will be added to your second mid-term examination. If you miss the second mid-term examination, and you provide me with the appropriate documentation, you will be assigned a research paper worth 30% of your grade, which will be due on the final day of classes (6 Dec.). The only acceptable reasons for missing an examination in this class, as listed in the Deferral of Final Examinations section of the University of Calgary Calendar (<http://www.ucalgary.ca/pubs/calendar/current/g-6.html>), are illness, domestic affliction, or religious conviction.

Assignments: There are four mandatory written assignments throughout the semester. Each of these assignments will be worth 10% of your grade, for a total of 40%. The assignments will be handed out *in the Thursday lab and will be due two weeks later at the beginning of the Thursday lab (15:30) with the exception of the final Assignment which will be due in class on the last day of class (12:30)*. We will not accept e-mail submissions of assignments. Only hard copies of assignments will be accepted. Assignments must be typed and stapled. Assignments are due: 27 September, 18 October, 8 November, and 6 December.

NOTE: Late assignments will receive a grade reduction of 15% for each day past the deadline. The 15% grade reduction per day also applies to weekend days and holidays. If you hand in your assignment more than FIFTEEN MINUTES past the time it is due (ie after 15:45), it will be

considered one day late.

Your final grade will be computed as follows:

- Mid Term One 30%
- Mid Term Two 30%
- Assignments 40%

Grade Reappraisal

Within two weeks of the date the exam/assignment is returned, students seeking reappraisal of examinations or assignments must submit a written response to the instructor explaining the basis for reconsideration of one's mark. The instructor will reconsider the grade assigned and will then book a time with the student to discuss his or her work and rationale. It should be noted that a re- assessed grade may be raised, lowered, or remain the same.
