COURSE OVERVIEW AND OBJECTIVES:

This course is an introduction to the philosophy and practice of social research. Its aim is to help students examine their assumptions about the reality of the social world and its workings, explore some of the choices and dilemmas encountered in any research undertaking, and learn about some of the quantitative and qualitative methods available to sociologists pursuing research questions. Research processes including problem definition, data collection and analyses; quantitative and qualitative strategies. Students are expected to acquire skills through doing research. Aside from providing an introductory opportunity to learn about the practice of sociology, though, this course also aims to enable students to become more informed consumers and readers of social research as they become more aware of its framing and the criteria by which it is judged.

This is a challenging course. Along with readings, exams and quizzes, three lab assignments emphasize the practice of social research. But this can be an interesting course, too, if you keep up with the readings and participate thoughtfully in class and lab discussions as well as the exercises. TEXTS:

COURSE REQUIREMENTS AND GRADING:

The grade for this course will be determined as follows: 1) two exams worth 15% each. The midterm is tentatively set for Wednesday, July 25, 2012, and the final is Registrar controlled with date TBA; 2) regular text chapter quizzes administered in lab (total 20%), 3) discussion sparks for each chapter (10%, students provide brief chapter commentary prior to associated lectures), 4) three lab assignments (#1 = 10%; #2 = 15%; #3 = 15%) to be completed successively throughout the term. The first assignment will involve a basic orientation to research resources, the second will see the production of a short survey instrument, and the third will entail a qualitative content analysis of publicly available web-based resources. The materials covered in lectures and labs, as well as the assigned readings, are the basis of all of the above course requirements. Late assignments will be penalized at the rate of five percent per day. Otherwise, students should note the regulations outlined later in this outline.

Deferrals:

Ethics Research: Students are advised that any research with human subjects--including any interviewing (even with friends and family), opinion polling, or unobtrusive observation--must have the approval of the Departmental Ethics Committee. In completing course requirements, students must not undertake any human subjects research without discussing their plans with the instructor, to determine if ethics approval is required.

Academic Misconduct: Plagiarism, cheating and other academic misconduct are regarded as serious academic offences. Students are advised to consult the University Calendar which presents a Statement of Intellectual Honesty and definitions and penalties associated with cheating, plagiarism, and other academic misconduct.

The Freedom of Information and Protection of Privacy (FOIP) legislation disallows the practice of having students retrieve assignments from a public place, e.g., outside an instructor's office or the Department main office. Written assignments must be returned to students individually, during class, or during the instructor's office hours; if a student is unable to pick up her/his assignment s/he may provide the instructor with a stamped, self-addressed envelope to be used for the return of the assignment.
