Course Description

Why do members of society use force and fraud? That is, why do not people simply use socially acceptable means of attaining their wants and needs? This course will introduce students to the most prominent theories constructed in the sociology of deviance, crime, and social control. What is deviance and who has the ability to define it? Why and how does this definition change over time? Do we try to control seemingly harmless types of deviance too often? From our readings and congenial class discussions, we will explore these issues by considering how various sociological theories approach them. **Students are warned that, at times, this class deals with graphic and violent themes in both lectures and videos.**

Course Objectives/Learning Outcomes

Students in Introduction to Deviance and Social Control will learn how to:

1. Identify the differences between positivist and constructionist perspectives on crime, deviance, and social control.
2. Identify the most salient problems with measuring crime.
3. Explain ways in which crime statistics are generated.
4. Explain the main assumptions of each approach to crime, deviance and social control.
5. Evaluate the potential of each perspective examined.
6. Identify the key challenges of current responses to crime.

Course Format

Lectures for this course will be delivered via Desire2Learn (D2L). There will be MP4 videos for students to consider. The class will be run with asynchronous involvement of students. In other words, there are no precise lecture times for students to attend. Rather, documents can be retrieved at any time. Of course, there are specific due dates for quizzes (see below).

Methods of Assessment and Grading Weights

Students will have 120 minutes to complete the universally designed quizzes within a 24 hour window. In other words, the exams will be available for 24 hours starting at 8:00am on the dates identified above. I will be available electronically on the day of quizzes from 8:00am until 10:00am.

Quizzes are open book. That means you are free to review any documents that have been provided to you on D2L. Students are not allowed, however, to collaborate with other students in any way when completing quizzes. This includes voice, text, or chat etc. The use of collaboratively-authored study notes such as those generated or shared in chat groups or file sharing sites are not to be used when completing quizzes. The use of sources (online or otherwise) not provided by the instructor to create study notes to prepare for quizzes are not to be used. The use of online file sharing and tutoring sites should not be used to prepare for quizzes. Lastly, the use of online materials not provided by the instructor should not be used when completing quizzes. Grade Reappraisal
