Course Description:

This course will introduce students to the sociology of families from various sociological perspectives. It will be the goal of this course to provide students with a thorough grounding in both the theoretical and substantive issues in the sociological study of families and family life. Topics that we will explore include: defining a family, theoretical perspectives in the study of the family, the historical family, family organization, marriage and parenting, work and the family, the transitional family, and the changing Canadian family.

Course Objectives:

1. To provide a broad, introductory view of the sociological study of families, particularly Canadian families.
2. To introduce the student to both theoretical and empirical issues in the study of families.
3. To develop skills to critically examine, evaluate, and understand the social issues of the family which impact the student within his/her own life and within the larger society.

Course Requirements:

Students are required to complete two midterm exams, one Registrar-scheduled final exam, and one written assignment. The midterm exams will consist of both multiple-choice and written responses. All exams will be non-cumulative.

For midterm exams and the final exam, students will be responsible for all material covered in lectures, required readings, and films. If you miss a class, you are responsible for getting the lecture notes from another student. Therefore, finding a “student buddy” will be necessary. I will **not** distribute my lecture notes to students.

Details of the written assignment will be provided at a later date.

Exam Policies:

You must provide **advance** notice to the instructor if you are unable to take an exam (**by email**). All requests for deferral of an examination due to health reasons must be accompanied by written documentation as outlined in the University Calendar and should be obtained while the student has the physical or emotional problem rather than after recovery. Deferred exams may be allowed in the following circumstances: illness, domestic affliction, or religious conviction. If you have missed an exam for a legitimate reason, you will be able to write a “make-up” exam as close to the original exam as possible. The date and location will be at the convenience of the Sociology Department. Travel arrangements and misreading of the syllabus are not valid reasons for requesting a deferred exam. Deferred exams will not be granted if it is determined that just cause is not shown by the student.

Ethics Research:

Students are advised that any research with human subjects – including any interviewing (even with friends or family), opinion polling, or unobtrusive observation – must have the approval of the Department Ethics Committee. In completing course requirements, students must not undertake any human subject research without discussing their plans with the instructor, to determine if ethics approval is required.

Academic Misconduct:

Cheating is regarded as a serious academic offence. Students are advised to consult the University Calendar, which presents a Statement of Intellectual Honesty and definitions and penalties associated with cheating, plagiarism, and other academic misconduct.

The Freedom of Information and Protection of Privacy (FOIP) legislation disallows the practice of having students retrieve assignments from a public place, e.g. outside an instructor's office or the Department main office. Term assignments must be returned to the students individually, during class, or during the instructor's office hours. If a student is unable to pick up his/her assignment s/he may provide the instructor with a stamped, self-addressed envelope to be used for the return of the assignment.

1. When students are unable to submit papers at class, they should make arrangements to hand in their papers directly to the instructor or teaching assistant rather than at the Sociology Department main office.
2. Final papers will not be returned through the Sociology Department main office. The Freedom of Information and Protection of Privacy (FOIP) legislation disallows the practice of having students retrieve assignments from a public place, (i.e. outside the instructor's office, the department office, etc.). Students who want their final papers returned by mail must attach a stamped, self-addressed envelope with the paper. Otherwise, final papers will only be available for pick-up during the instructor's office hours at the end of this term or the beginning of the next term.
3. Final grades are not posted by the Sociology Department. They are only available on-line.
